MINISTRY TO PRIESTS


While our priests support and nurture our sacramental life and serve as administrators of parish life, some may wonder who serves them? In 2018, Ministry to Priests was formed to offer ongoing spiritual, fraternal and pastoral development for all diocesan and religious priests serving in the Diocese of St. Petersburg. And in the time since its creation, it has blossomed!

Currently under the guidance of Rev. Arthur Proulx, the "priest for priests," spiritual direction, sacramental reconciliation, support groups for a variety of ages and stages in our priest's vocation and care of retired priests are all a part of our pastoral ministry budget. "I have enjoyed my whole ministry here as the Director of Ministry to Priests and ministering to people that I have a lot of admiration and concern for," explained Father Proulx, sharing how important it is for our diocese to have this ministry, sharing the reality of most retired

priests, explaining, "I've been a priest since 1980, and this is one of the most rewarding jobs I've ever had. Particularly keeping in mind that a lot of priests have no family at all. It's especially important for the Diocese to reach out to them, to let them know they haven't been forgotten."

This ministry includes a variety of reflection and retreat opportunities offered each year, continuing development in areas of Scripture, spirituality and pastoral formation as well as working with our international priests and the growing number of newly ordained who diligently serve in parishes across our diocese.

From covering Masses for parishes in need to collaborating with our Priest Wellness Coordinator, our Director travels from one end of the Diocese to the other to ensure the overall wellness of the dedicated men he serves.

DISCIPLESHIP DAYS

Growing our parishes has been a concern for many parish leaders post pandemic. In response to feedback from our previous "Parish Growth Summit" a diocesan pastoral team planned and presented a free, immersive dive into parish growth at Discipleship Days held in three different locations January 26, 27, and 28, 2023.

"Our diocesan pastoral team collaborates with our parishes to unlock the potential for amazing ministry now and in the future," said Dr. Lois Locey, Chancellor for Administration and Chief Operating Officer of the Diocese of St. Petersburg. "Our goal is to support and energize parishes' efforts to cultivate servant leaders who live out their baptismal calling, nurture disciples through vibrant encounters and empower communities to become missionary-focused."

Discipleship Days, funded through donations to the Catholic Ministry Appeal, drew more than 350 clergy, lay ecclesial ministers and volunteer leaders from 75 parishes and six schools.

The headline speaker for Discipleship Days was the energetic and engaging,

author, TV host, renowned chef and national Eucharistic Preacher, Father Leo Patalinghug. Practical and applicable sessions provided attendees the unique opportunity to renew both personal and faith communities' commitment to the mandate of Jesus Christ to "Go and Make Disciples."

In addition, participants experienced inspirational sessions by Dr. Locey, Dr. Armando Chavarria, Executive Director of Missionary Discipleship, Rev. Chuck Dornquast, Diocesan Vocation Director and Carlos Flores, Director of Intercultural Ministries on the "path" to discipleship. Small group sessions focused on strategies for overcoming obstacles and short and long-term discipleship in parish communities.

Because discipleship and growing the Church are vital to our future, the Diocese of St. Petersburg is hoping to make events like Discipleship Days a part of how we courageously live the Gospel.



GULF COAST CATHOLIC

Parish life and parishioner's stories about their faith serve as the inspiration for a new media tool to reach all Catholics throughout the Tampa Bay, Nature Coast and Suncoast areas. The Gulf Coast Catholic Magazine was launched by Bishop Gregory Parkes in September 2023 in response to ideas expressed during his listening sessions hosted throughout the Diocese. This new printed publication strives to connect and bring all parishioner of our five counties closer together.

"This quarterly magazine's mission is to lead people closer to Jesus and His Church so we can live as good Catholics," said Teresa Peterson, the **Executive Director of Communications** at the Diocese of St. Petersburg. "We provide timely and relevant articles, and testimonials for staying up to date with Catholic life and stories about those who are Courageously Living the Gospel."

Since its launch, the magazine has been mailed directly to registered parishioners, approximately 100,000 households, and is now available on Instagram (@GulfCoastCatholic). In each issue, readers find tips for growing in faith, enhancing spirituality, and deepening prayer.

"My hope for the Gulf Coast Catholic is that it increases awareness of issues that impact Catholics' faith. We also hope to increase the spreading of the good news by placing the magazine in businesses, restaurants and hospitals throughout the area," shared Peterson.



2023 WORLD YOUTH DAY

Dating back to 1986, Would Youth Day was introduced by Pope John Paul II as a way for the Holy Father to hear from our Church's youth from around the world, and for participants to encounter God and celebrate their faith.

In 2019, Pope Francis announced from Panama City, Panama the next World Youth Day would be in 2022 in Lisbon, Portugal. However, due to the increasing concern for COVID-19, the global event was pushed back to 2023. With an extra year to prepare, the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry gathered 118 pilgrims from around the Diocese of St. Petersburg to embark on this journey.

Ana Jahuey, a young parishioner at St. Cecelia Catholic Church and Administrative Assistant for Intercultural Ministries and the Lay Pastoral Ministry Institute of the Diocese of St. Petersburg, made the pilgrimage to Lisbon with her brother. "Being able to experience World Youth Day with my brother has brought us closer," Jahuey stated, "We grew up in a Marian household and Our Blessed Mother has been an inspiration for this trip. I'm glad we have this wonderful opportunity to journey

together and to live our faith at this moment of our lives."

Having grown up Catholic, she recently began learning more about her faith. World Youth Day presented an opportunity to deepen her love for Jesus. The first stop of the 10 day journey through Portugal was in Fatima. The venue offered peacefulness for many, including Ana. "Fatima was my favorite spot, getting to the house of Our Mother," she shared. "It was a very special moment. She has shown me a lot and has brought me closer to the Lord. I believe I felt her maternal love in the breeze of the wind."

World Youth Day may take place every few years, but the Office of Youth and Young Adult Ministry work hard at providing young Catholics in the Diocese of St. Petersburg with events and gatherings to meet others seeking a relationship with the Lord, no matter where they are on their spiritual journey. 

BEQUESTS, GRANTS AND INTEREST

Bishop Parkes and the ministries of the Pastoral Center are recipients of legacy bequests from generous parishioners through their estates, in addition to grants from independent organizations and foundations and a small amount of interest earnings. CATHEDRATICUM

Cathedraticum refers to funds paid by the parishes of a diocese to support the work of the Bishop. In the new model, it is calculated and submitted by the parishes in the Diocese each month based on their reported offertory and donations. This means payments from parishes are based on current income, not past income.

PROGRAM REVENUES

Program revenues include registration for events or programs, as well as fees paid by participants to some of our diocesan offices for direct services programs and services, such as parish level bookkeeping and accounting.

PARISH SUSTAINABILITY TRUST GRANT

The Parish Sustainability Trust utilizes investment earnings to cover the administrative costs for the Office of the Bishop and our ministries, services and entities of the Diocese. In 2022-2023, these temporal offices were funded through past savings as we transitioned to this new funding model. Next fiscal year, the Parish Sustainability Trust will issue a grant to operate our administrative functions.




